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TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2024

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditors' report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2023 to 31 August 2024. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a Directors' report under company law.

The Trustees of Moorlands Learning Trust present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the Trust for the year ended 31 August 2024. During the year they operated three secondary academies and 4 primary academies; Ilkley Grammar School, with 2,128 students on roll including 542 in P16, The Skipton Academy with 587 on roll, Nidderdale High School with 403 on roll, Ashlands Primary School with 320 on role, Burley Oaks Primary School with 395 on roll, Eastburn Primary School with 210 on roll and Menston Primary School with 400 on roll.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The Academy Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity.

The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust.

The Trustees of Moorlands Learning Trust are also the Directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law.

The charitable company is known as Moorlands Learning Trust (MLT).

Details of the Trustees who served during the year, and to the date these accounts are approved are included in the Reference and administrative details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' indemnity

The Academy Trust has purchased insurance to protect Trustees from claims arising against negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on Academy Trust business. This cover is provided by the DfE's Risk Protection Arrangement.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

The Academy Trust, on identifying a need to recruit an additional or replacement Trustee, will refer to the Trustee skills audit. They will then seek to recruit an individual with appropriate skills to help the Board of Trustees ensure effective governance. The Academy Trust may advertise the role or look at offers of service received both within the Academy Trust's schools and the wider community. Appointment will be subject to interview with the Chair of Trustees and CEO and a vote by the Board of Trustees.

The members appoint a minimum of 3 Trustees including the Chair of Trustees. The term of office for any Trustee shall be 4 years, save that this time limit shall not apply to the CEO or any post held ex-officio. Subject to remaining eligible to be a particular type of Trustee, any Trustee may be re-appointed or re-elected.

Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

New Trustees will meet the Chair, the CEO and the CFO to help with their assimilation into the role of Academy Trustee. All Trustees subscribe to the importance of communicating the Academy Trust's vision and values to stakeholders and all Trustees are also updated on all matters through the committee and Board meetings. Training requirements are considered to ensure that there is an appropriate balance of skills and experience on the Board at all times.

Organisational structure

The Trustees are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring the Academy Trust by the use of budgets and making major decisions about the direction of the Academy Trust, capital expenditure and senior staff appointments.

Most schools within the Trust have a Local Governing Body, Eastburn has an Advisory Board. These are focused on the interests of the individual academy and include parental and staff representatives. For the financial year ended 31 August 2024, The Skipton Academy had an Advisory Board, this school has moved to a Local Governing Body from 1st September 2024.

The Executive Group consists of the CEO, CFO, the Director of Primary and the Trust Executive Headteacher. The CEO is the Multi Academy Trust's Accounting Officer. The CEO and the CFO control the Trust at an executive level implementing the policies laid down by the Trustees and being accountable to them. Some responsibility is devolved to the Local Governing Bodies and Headteachers of each Academy.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The pay and remuneration of the CEO and CFO is proposed by the appraisal panel and ratified by the Pay Committee in line with the appraisal and pay policies.

The pay and remuneration of key management personnel is also proposed by appraisal panel upon which the Trust is represented by a member of the Executive Group. Pay is authorised by the Pay Committee in line with the appraisal and pay policies.

Trust Growth

In December 2019, The Skipton Academy (TSA) joined MLT and in January 2023 it was judged to be 'Good' in all areas for the first time in the history of the school. In September 2023, the following schools joined MLT: Nidderdale High School, Ashlands Primary School, Burley Oaks Primary School and Menston Primary School. Eastburn Primary School joined the Trust on 1st April 2024.

Strategic report

Achievements and performance

The Board considers that the following are key performance indicators for the Trust:

- Pupil numbers
- Student attendance
- Academic outcomes for students
- Students' destinations, post-16
- General financial stability
- Ofsted inspection outcomes

Student achievements

Year-on-year comparison of outcomes is not possible due to the disruption of the Covid-19 pandemic alongside new schools joining and contributing to trust-level outcomes and changes to assessment frameworks and performance measures. The following summarises the outcomes of our 7 schools .

llkley Grammar School

At likley Grammar School, results at both GCSE and A Level were once again very strong and many students excelled academically. This is the third year since 2019 that students have sat public examinations following their cancellation in 2020 and 2021 due to the Coronavirus pandemic, and the second year that there have been no mitigations for students put in place. With grading standards adjusted nationally back in line with 2019, results are not directly comparable to the last three years given that in 2020 and 2021 grades were based on teacher assessment rather than public examinations and 2022 was a transition year with widespread adaptations and more generous grading.

Therefore, comparisons have been made to 2019 rather than 2022 with some 2023 national references where available.

A-Level:

- Overall attainment and progress of students was very strong and have further improved from the positive outcomes in 2023. Based on 2023 benchmarks as reported in the IDSR, it is expected that A-Level APS (38.9) and the Best 3 APS (39.3) will continue to be significantly positive and in the top 10% of all schools nationally.
- The A level average grade attainment measure was B in line with Summer 22/23 results.

GCSE:

Overall attainment and progress of students was very strong and have further improved from the positive
outcomes secured in 2023 in almost all areas. When the performance tables are published, we expect our
estimated P8 score of +.57 to again place IGS in the highest "well above average" category with attainment
and progress overall and in the individual buckets expected to be significantly above average and in the top
20% of all schools nationally.

Achievements and performance (continued)

The Skipton Academy (TSA)

Overall attainment and progress of students was lower this year compared to national and the results achieved last year, was due to a range of issues and unique circumstances. The Trust and the school are confident that this is a one off with expected Progress 8 of -0.6.

Numbers on roll continue to grow considerably and this is indicative of the overall improvement profile of the school, building on many years' improvement since 2018.

Nidderdale High School

The results improved on last year and are expected to be in line with national average. Attainment 8 improved on last year and the % of students gaining a Standard Pass has significantly improved since last year.

Progress 8 is expected to be in line with national at -0.1.

Ashlands Primary

Reading & Maths Age Related Expectations were above national average. 31% of pupils are reading at Greater Depth. 75% of pupils were at Age Related Expectations in Maths with 25% working at Greater Depth, both above the National Average.

Burley Oaks Primary

Reading & Maths Age Related Expectations were above national average. 30% of pupils are reading at Greater Depth. 74% of pupils were at Age Related Expectations in Maths with 30% working at Greater Depth, both above the national average.

Eastburn Primary

Reading, Writing & Maths Age Related Expectations were above national average. 44% of pupils are at Greater Depth in Reading. 81% of pupils of pupils are at Age Related Expectation in Maths with 44% at Greater Depth.

Menston Primary

Reading, Writing & Maths Age Related Expectations are above national average. 46% of pupils are at Greater Depth in Reading. 88% of pupils are at Age related Expectation in Maths with 44% at Greater Depth.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Board of Trustees has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

Financial review

Most of the Academy Trust's income is obtained from the Department of Education (DfE) via the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE/ESFA during the year ended 31 August 2024 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Academy Trust also received grants for fixed assets from the DfE/ESFA. In accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (FRS 102), such grants are shown under the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the fixed asset fund. The restricted fixed asset fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the expected useful life of the assets concerned. During the year, income is shown as significantly higher than prior year due to the inclusion of land and buildings on conversion for the schools joining the Trust.

During the year ended 31 August 2024, total expenditure of £32,129,000 was in excess of recurrent grant funding from DfE/ESFA together with other incoming resources. Before transfers and actuarial losses, and excluding restricted fixed asset and pension reserves, the in-year surplus was £694,000; including pension reserves, the in-year surplus was £694,000. During this year an increase in staff costs of £10.2m and catering costs of £0.68m have been more than offset by a increase in GAG funding of £9.3m and an increase in other income from the Trust's operations of £1.5m.

All of the expenditure shown in the Statement of Financial Activities is in furtherance of the academy's objectives.

At 31 August 2024 net book value of fixed assets was £46,735,000 and movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 14 to the Financial Statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the students of the Academy Trust.

The provisions of Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 have been applied in full in respect of LGPS pension scheme, resulting in a deficit of £456,000 recognised on the Balance Sheet.

The Academy Trust held fund balances as at 31 August 2024 of £48,405,000 comprising £1,033,000 of restricted general funds, £47,304,000 of restricted fixed asset funds, £524,000 unrestricted funds and a pension deficit of £456,000. The balance on restricted general funds, excluding pension reserve, plus the balance on unrestricted reserves at 31 August 2024 is a net surplus of £1,557,000.

Reserves policy

The policy of the Academy Trust is to allocate a prudent level of funds to meet long-term recurring needs of renewal and any other unforeseen expenditure, subject to the constraint that the level of resource does not exceed the level permitted by the ESFA.

The Academy Trust has three categories of reserves: Restricted funds, which is ESFA funding used to carry out the principal objects of the organisation, Fixed Asset reserve used to finance fixed assets and unrestricted reserves which is used under the direction of the Trustees.

Unrestricted Reserves are freely available for general purposes and, where available, these will be allocated in line with the strategic objectives of the Academy Trust.

The level of reserves is reviewed by the Trustees regularly throughout the year. The review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and nature of reserves. The Trustees therefore consider it prudent to hold reserves in the general fund in the form of free reserves at 5% of income.

The current reserves (excluding restricted fixed asset fund and pension fund) are £1,557,000. This balance is held to support the schools within the Academy Trust with increasing costs over the coming year (for example staff pay) and to enable the Academy Trust to grow and support more schools in the local area.

The restricted funds of £47,881,000 include the restricted fixed asset fund of £47,304,000. The restricted pension fund is currently in deficit to the value of £456,000 as at 31 August 2024.

Investment policy

The Academy Trust monitors cash flow to ensure immediate and forthcoming commitments can be met. Surplus funds are invested in risk free, short, fixed term deposit accounts with British banks.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties are centred around changes in the level of funding from the DfE/ESFA, over which the Academy Trust has no control. The Academy Trust is a member of the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS), which results in the recognition of a significant potential deficit on the Academy Trust balance sheet if the Academy Trust was called upon to meet it. Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding local government pension scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Academy Trust is exposed, in particular those relating specifically to teaching provision of facilities and other operational areas of the Academy Trust, and its finances. The Trustees have implemented a number of systems to assess risks that the school faces, especially in the operational areas (e.g. in relation to quality of teaching, health and safety, student mental health and school visits) and in relation to the control of finance. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover. The Academy Trust has an effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detail in the Governance Statement.

The Academy Trust is subject to a number of risks and uncertainties in common with other academies. The Academy Trust has in place procedures to identify and mitigate financial and other risks.

Fundraising

The Academy Trust does not use any external fundraisers. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Trustees.

Quantification and Reporting Methodology

We have followed the 2019 HM Government Environmental Reporting Guidelines. We have also used the GHG Reporting Protocol - Corporate Standard and have used the 2021 UK Government's Conversion Factors for Company Reporting.

The chosen intensity measurement ratio is total gross emissions in metric tonnes CO2e per pupil, the recommended ratio for the sector.

Measures taken to improve energy efficiency

We continue to bid for energy efficient funding for example to replace dilapidated roofs. We have replaced 2 old minibuses with newer more energy efficient models.

Plans for future periods

The Academy Trust plans to build further on the excellent results of 2023/24 and to continue with the plans approved by Trustees in the Trust Development Plan. The Trust will continue to support and invest in staff and facilities to ensure the best outcomes for our students.

At Moorlands Learning Trust, partnerships matter and we value our work with a wide range of stakeholders. This includes the Red Kite Teaching School Alliance, where we work with several similar schools across the Leeds, Harrogate and the North Yorkshire region, for the training and development of teachers. We are also committed to working with our fellow Bradford and Craven schools to support the delivery of the best outcomes for children, young people and our communities across the Craven and Bradford Districts. Moorlands Learning Trust's wider aim is to contribute to wider system leadership and school to school support through enhanced partnership working.

Review of value for money

The Board of Trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the Academy Trust's significant risks that has been in place for the year 1 September 2023 to 31 August 2024 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the Board of Trustees.

The risk and control framework

The Academy Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- Comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Board of Trustees,
- Regular reviews by Trustees and Local Governing Bodies of reports which indicate financial performance
 against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes,
- Setting targets to measure financial and other performance,
- Clearly defined procurement guidelines, and
- Identification and management of risks.

The Board of Trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided to appoint an internal auditor. The Board of Trustees has decided to buy-in an internal audit service from WBG Services LLP from 1 September 2022. Prior to this date, the function was carried out by the Academy Trust's own internal audit function.

The internal auditor reports to the Board of Trustees, through the Audit and Risk Committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the Board of Trustees' financial responsibilities. Appropriate action plans have been put in place to mitigate any material audit findings.

Review of effectiveness

As accounting officer, the Chief Executive Officer has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the internal auditor;
- the school resource management self-assessment tool;
- the work of the executive managers within the Academy Trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements of the Academy Trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historic cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2023 to 2024 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Going concern

The Trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Academy Trust to continue as a going concern. The Trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the Academy Trust has put sufficient measures in place and has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the Academy Trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance Sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the year is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the Balance Sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the year it is receivable and to the extent the Academy Trust has provided the goods or services.

Transfer on conversion

Where assets and liabilities are received by the Academy Trust on conversion to an academy, the transferred assets are measured at fair value and recognised in the Balance Sheet at the point when the risks and rewards of ownership pass to the Academy Trust. An equal amount of income is recognised as a transfer on conversion within 'Income from Donations and Capital Grants' to the net assets received.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the Academy Trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the Academy Trust apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

1.5 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy Trust at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by the funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £5,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the Government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The premises are held on 125-year leases from City of Bradford Metropolitan District Council and North Yorkshire County Council. As the risks and rewards have transferred to the Academy Trust, the asset has been recognised within tangible fixed assets. The initial acquisition was recognised at existing use valuation by DTZ and by Eddison's Commercial, on behalf of the Education and Skills Funding Agency. The Trustees consider that the cost of obtaining an additional valuation would outweigh the benefits.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful lives, as follows:

Long leasehold buildings	- 50 years
Long leasehold land	- 125 years
Fixtures and fittings	- 10 years
Computer equipment	- 3 years
Motor vehicles	- 5 years

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use and reclassified to leasehold land and buildings.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.7 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Academy Trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.8 Leased assets

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.9 Taxation

The Academy Trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the Academy Trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.10 Financial instruments

The Academy Trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the Academy Trust and their measurement bases are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 16. Prepayments are not financial instruments. Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in notes 17 and 18. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.11 Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for obsolete and slow-moving stocks. Cost includes all direct costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

1.12 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.13 Pensions

Retirement benefits to employees of the Academy Trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ("TPS") and the Local Government Pension Scheme ("LGPS"). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Academy Trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy Trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each Balance Sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

1.14 Agency arrangements

The Academy Trust acts as an agent in distributing 16-19 bursary funds from the ESFA. Payments received from the ESFA and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the statement of financial activities as the trust does not have control over the charitable application of the funds. The trust does not apply an administration charge. The funds received and paid and any balances held are disclosed in note 31.

2. Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The Academy Trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 22, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2022 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2024. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its residual value, over the economic life of that asset. An estimate of the useful life of assets is detailed in the depreciation accounting policy. The value of depreciation charge during the year was £976,000.

Critical areas of judgement:

Land – Land is held under a 125 year lease from Bradford Metropolitan Council and North Yorkshire County Council. These assets are included on the balance sheet of the academy due to the significant risks and rewards of ownership belonging to the academy, the lease term being the major part of the economic life of the assets and the assets being of such a specialised nature that only the academy could use them without major modification.

Pension asset - The original West Yorkshire Pension Fund scheme valuation showed an asset of £960,000. Part of the North Yorkshire Pension Fund scheme showed an asset of £56,000. The asset valuations are highly dependent on a number of assumptions and do not represent the future value of benefits to the trust. Therefore, a restriction on the asset value of these schemes was recommended by the actuaries who valued them. As a result, the Trustees have decided to include the pension asset for these schemes at £nil.

Land and buildings on conversion - During the period 5 schools converted from Local Authority governance to Academy status and joined the Trust. These school are Nidderdale High School, Ashlands Primary School, Burley Oaks Primary School, Eastburn Primary School and Menston Primary School. On conversion, independent valuations were obtained from Eddisons Commercial Limited, a RICS regulated valuation agent, and those valuations used as the basis of recognising the land and buildings of the schools in this period's financial statements. The total value of land and buildings relating to the new schools recognised in the financial statements is £28,460,000.

22. Pension commitments

The Academy Trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Mercer Limited. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2020 and of the LGPS 31 March 2022.

Contributions amounting to £368,000 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2024 (2023 - £378,000) and are included within accruals.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full-time teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to ensure scheme costs are recognised and managed appropriately and the review specifies the level of future contributions.

Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2020. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 27 October 2023, with the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, applying a notional investment return based on 1.7% above the rate of CPI. The key elements of the valuation outcome are:

- employer contribution rates set at 28.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy). This is an increase of 5% in employer contributions and the cost control.
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £262,000 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £222,200 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £39,800 million

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2028.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the year amounted to £2,987,000 (2023 - £1,611,000).

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The Academy Trust is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the plan. Accordingly, the academy trust has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 102 and has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The Academy Trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trusteeadministered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2024 was £1,470,000 (2023 - £827,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £1,090,000 (2023 - £618,000) and employees' contributions totalled £ 380,000 (2023 - £209,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 17.8% to 21.0% for employers and 5.5% to 12.5% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013 and on 21 July 2022, the Department for Education reaffirmed its commitment to the guarantee, with a parliamentary minute published on GOV.UK.

The original West Yorkshire Pension Fund scheme valuation showed an asset of $\pounds 960,000$. Part of the North Yorkshire Pension Fund scheme showed an asset of $\pounds 56,000$. The asset valuations are highly dependent on a number of assumptions and do not represent the future value of benefits to the trust. Therefore, a restriction on the asset value of these schemes was recommended by the actuaries who valued them. As a result, the Trustees have decided to include the pension asset for these schemes at \pounds nil.

30. Related party transactions

31. Agency arrangements

The Academy Trust administers the disbursement of the new discretionary support for learners, 16-19 Bursary Funds, on behalf of the ESFA. In the year it received £20,000 (2023: £14,000) and disbursed £17,000 (2023: £19,000) leaving a balance of £6,000 (2023: £3,000) included in accruals and deferred income.

During the year the Academy Trust collected monies totalling £686 (2023: £nil) on behalf of The Skipton Academy's Parents and Teachers Association (PTA) as part of a fundraising event being held by the latter organisation. The monies were disbursed in full to the PTA leaving a closing balance of £nil at the year end.
